Lewis Gilbert (ALFIE) directs this adventure that has the intense character study of BILLY BUDD and the epic sea battles of CAPTAIN HORATIO HORNBLOWER. Alec Guinness, Captain of HMS Defiant, is sabotaged by sadistic First Lieutenant Dirk Bogarde who steals the fire of a mutinous crew press-ganged into service during the war with France.

Saturday, June 2 - 7:30 PM SPIRIT OF ADVENTURE Double Feature: DARK OF THE SUN, 1968, Warner Bros., 100 min. Cinematographer Jack Cardiff (THE RED SHOES) directed this entertaining tale of mercenaries Rod Taylor and Jim Brown, who are hired to recover diamonds from a rebel-threatened jungle town. They commandeer a train towards their goal, but must also be on guard against ex-Nazi Peter Carsten. The movie poster showcased a chainsaw-wielding Aryan threatening a bare-chested Taylor with explosions in the background. With Yvette Mimieux. NOT ON DVD BHOWANI JUNCTION. 1956, Warner Bros., 110 min. Director George Cukor shot this post-WWII adventure in Pakistan (standing in for India). Colonel Stewart Granger, working for the transition from British to Indian rule, is beset by terrorists as well as non-violent demonstrators. Anglo-Indian Ava Gardner is caught in the middle. Granger and Gardner's quarrelling soon turns to love, but they find themselves helpless pawns amidst the larger struggle. NOT ON DVD
